Up Close and Personal:

An Interview with Charles L. Miller Award Winner Carol Roberts-Corb

Each year WACUHO bestows the Charles L. Miller Award on a current member who has through their dedicated service and outstanding leadership made significant contributions in service to the Association. This year's recipient was Carol Roberts-Corb, Associate Dean of Students at Concordia University Irvine.

Her numerous nominations from supervisors, peers and staff praised her commitment to the field, the association, and most importantly her students. The accolades ranged from "I can think of no other current Association member who has consistently, year after year, decade after decade, served on a WACUHO committee such as Carol," to "she has been a constant reminder to serve and lead with integrity and grace. She has been an amazing support, advocate, supervisor, and leader for the residential education and services office." One nominator remarked, "as I reflect back upon 28 years in Higher Education, Carol is among the top 1% of staff with whom I have had the privilege to work."



Carol's journey into residence life began while at the University of California, Santa Barbara in hall government. Carol's first RA, whom she called "just beyond all perfection", inspired her to apply. Carol had to make the tough decision when faced with an opportunity to study abroad. Luckily for us, she decided to stay stateside and became an RA in her junior year.

Carol would later become a Head Resident at UCSB before heading east to the University of Vermont to pursue her masters. After graduating, Carol accepted a position at the University of Southern California. She was immediately put to work on committees for CACUHO (the predecessor to WACUHO) and ACUHO-I, as USC was hosting both.

She has served on numerous committees for both associations and when asked to do more always responds, "yes, I can!" There are few things within WACUHO that Carol hasn't done.

Carol has presented numerous times both regionally and nationally. She recounts her favorite program as a series of presentations that she did on sexual harassment and women's issues with colleagues from other institutions. "What I enjoyed most about

it was the collaboration of other excellent women. They were so wonderful to learn from."

During the course of our interview, Carol responded to many of my questions for advice and suggestions. Tidbits of that conversation are listed below:

Advice for our mid-level professionals

“Develop a specialty or a specific area that you are passionate about and become an expert in it. Something that sets you apart from everybody else in Residential Life. So not only something that brands you or is on your resume or your horizons as a housing professional, but something that keeps you motivated and something that’s your own and that you can develop and get excited about.”

Balance was a key issue for new professionals

“Make sure that you’re having a life...make sure that you’re developing friendships off campus with peers and getting to know people that aren’t necessarily involved in housing and residential life and student affairs.”

Working 9 – 5...sorta

“One of my mentors always said when I started a new job to always make sure I only worked 40 hours a week, because she said if you go to a new campus and you are immediately working 60 or 80 hours a week that they’ll always expect that. There will come a time when you want to have more of a normal life. I always think of her whenever I change jobs and I need to very quickly establish my boundaries and have a good, balanced life.”

Invest in your Future

“If you move in, you’re saving money. If you invest the money that you’d be paying in rent, but you’re not paying in rent, like starting a 401K or socking away that money, it will build up by the time you want to move out and you want to buy a house or buy furniture. You’ll have money for retirement, because if you start saving when you’re young it will help you out when you get older.”

People to meet when you’re at WACUHO 2008 in Sacramento

“People should meet **Martin (Castillo)**, our President, and **Suzanne (“Seppy” Seplow)**, the President-Elect. You should certainly let them know if you are interested in serving the organization, tell them who you are and how you want to get involved...

Certainly if you are new you would want to go to new professional activities, because that is a great way to get involved.”

On Winning at WANGO

“It wasn’t called WANGO back in the day. I can’t think of when it started to be called WANGO. I clearly remember my first CACUHO in 1985 on the Queen Mary, I won a dead bolt. I was very excited to win but as a live-in person I was like ‘What am I going to do with this dead bolt?’”

Evening and Weekend Programming at University of Nevada, Las Vegas


